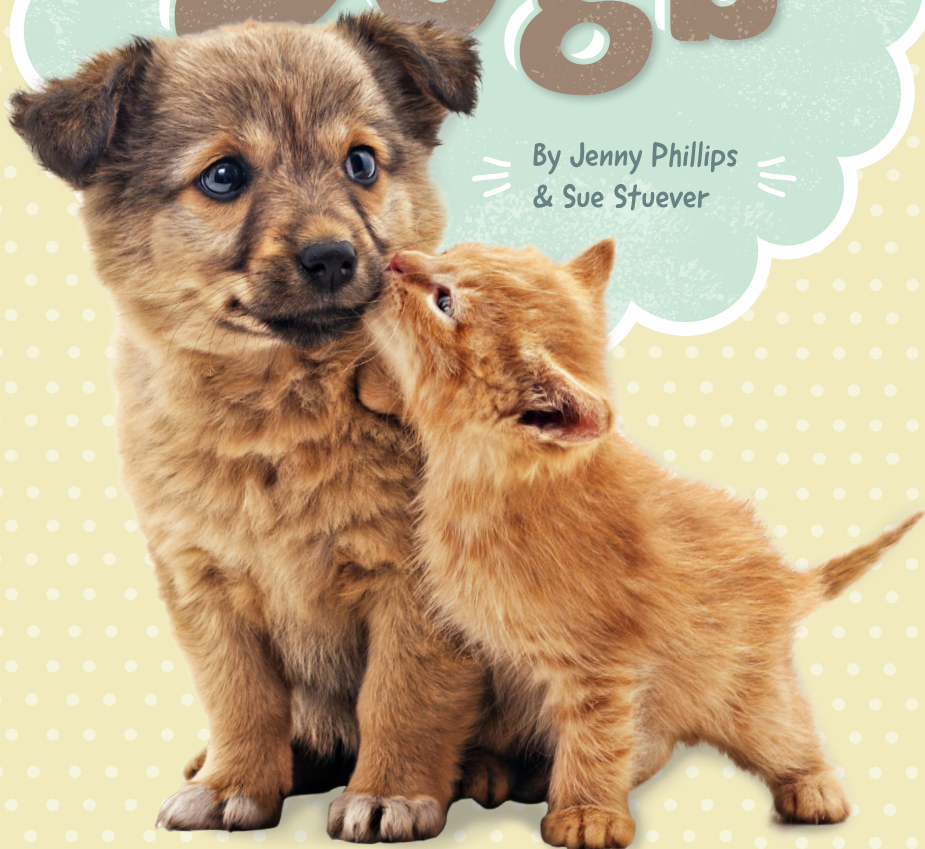

Frogs start life as eggs in the water. They grow into tadpoles. Then they grow into frogs that live on the land.



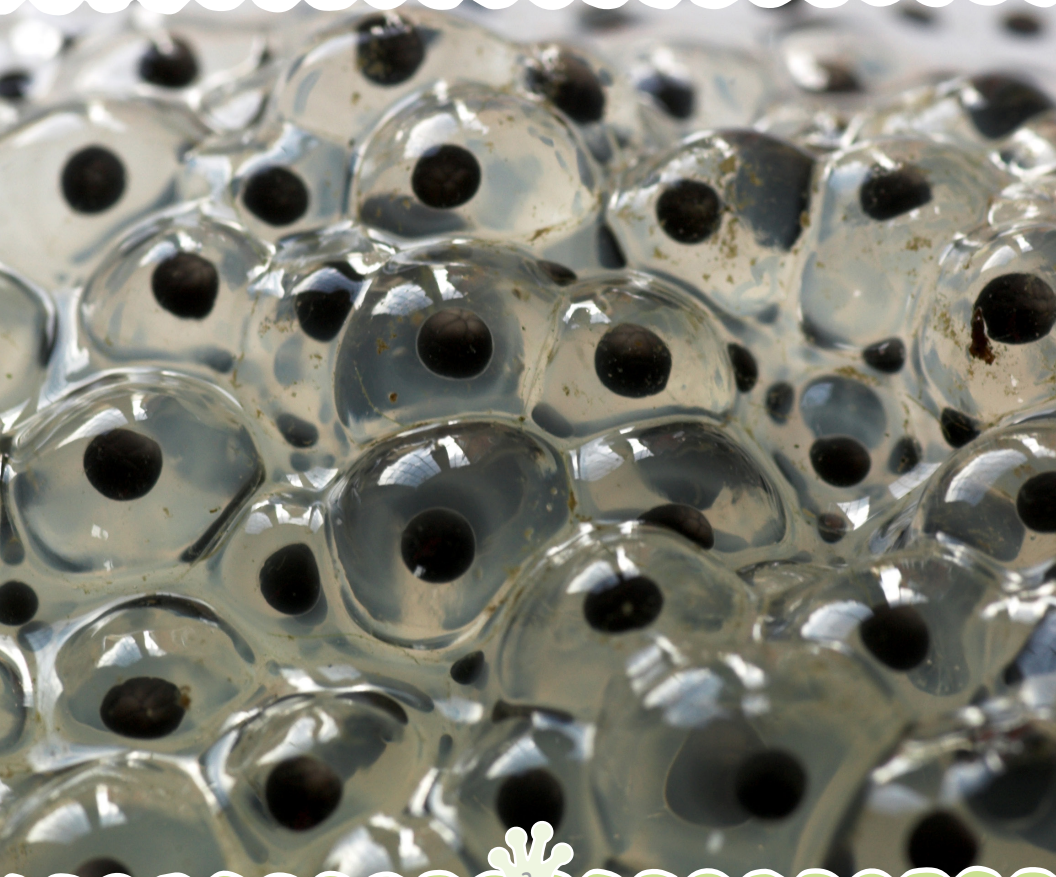


All frogs live by water.

Frogs lay eggs in the water. They lay lots of small eggs! A lot of eggs is called an egg mass.



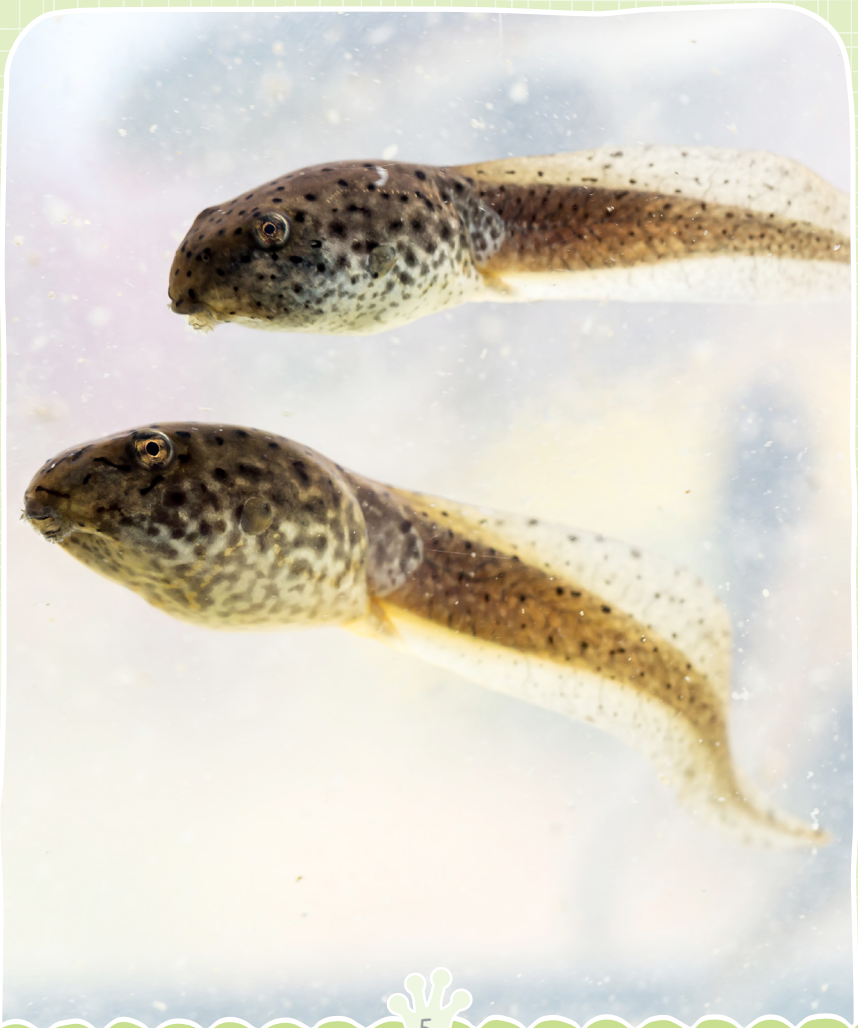


Small tadpoles swim out of the frog eggs. Tadpoles grow and grow for weeks.





Tadpoles may seem like fish, but they are not fish. They are small frogs.



Frogs hop on four legs.
Some frogs can hop up
to ten feet!



Snakes are reptiles. A reptile does not have warm blood like you and I.





Snakes that need to warm up go in the sun. Snakes that are too hot go in the shade. Do you see the snake under the rock?



Most snakes lay eggs, and small snakes come out of the eggs. In some kinds of snakes, the baby grows in the mother, not in an egg.

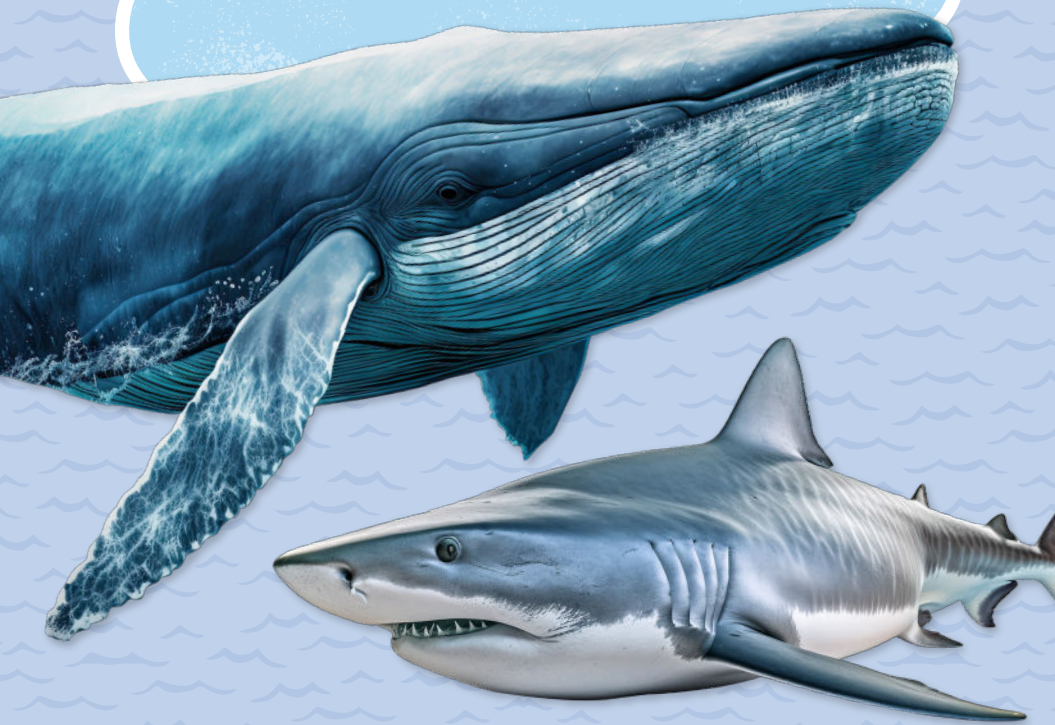

Sharks are fish. More than 500 kinds of sharks live in the seas.





Almost all sharks live in salt water, but some sharks live in fresh water, like lakes or rivers.



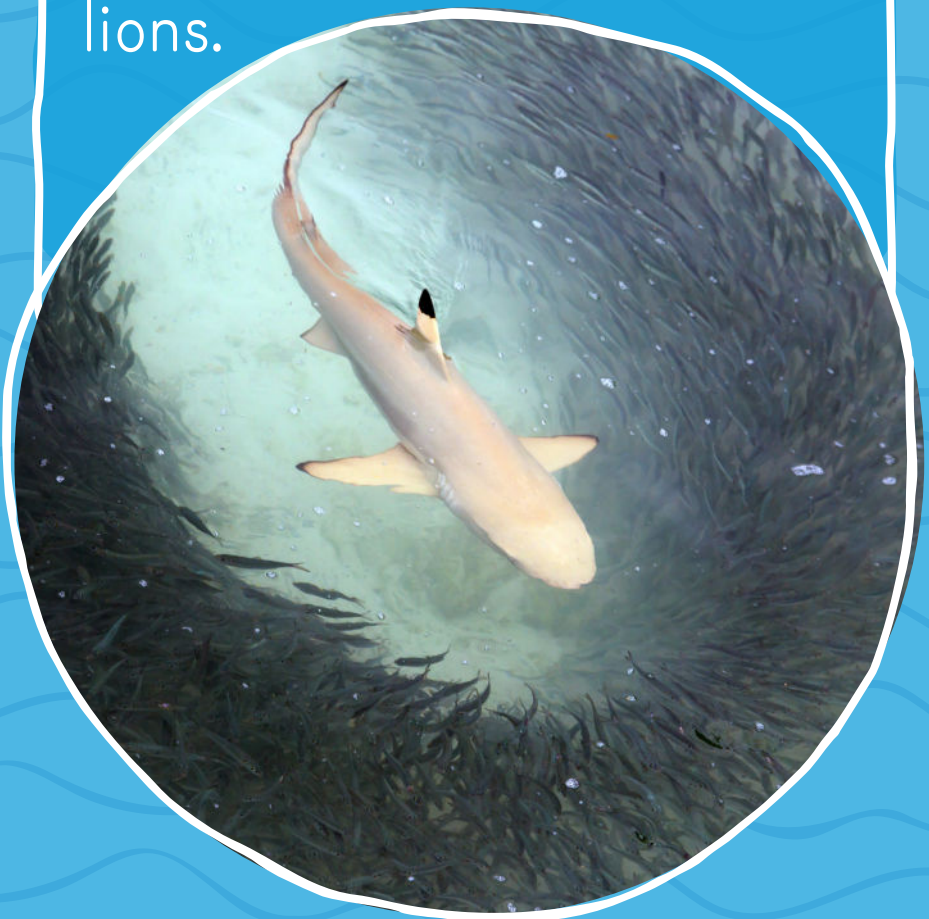


Some sharks live in deep water, and some live in shallow water. They live all over—deep in the sea, in reefs, and even under ice!





Most sharks eat fish.
Large sharks can eat
animals like seals and sea
lions.



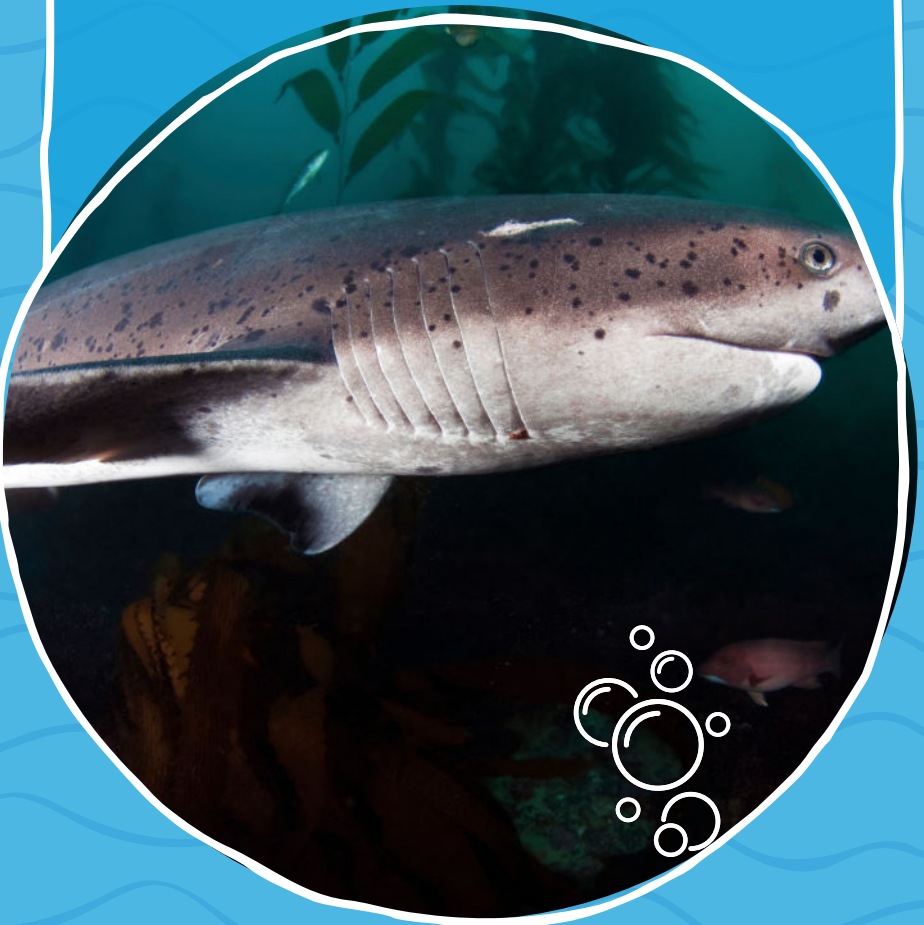


Sharks have many rows of sharp teeth that fall out as the sharks eat and grow.





Sharks get air from the
water in their gills.





Whales may live in the water and have a shape like fish, but they are not fish. Whales are mammals.





Baby whales drink rich milk from their mothers. Whale milk is as thick as toothpaste, with lots of good fat.





Most kinds of whales are toothed. The teeth help catch fish, but they do not chew.





Other whales have stiff plates called baleen. They swim with their mouths open, close them, push out water, then gulp the food left inside—fish, small plants, and krill.





Whales
live in warm
water part of
the year. Then
they swim to
icy cold water.



Thick skin
and a layer
of blubber, or
fat, keep the
whale warm
even in freezing
water. Blubber
also helps it float.

This beetle can fly.

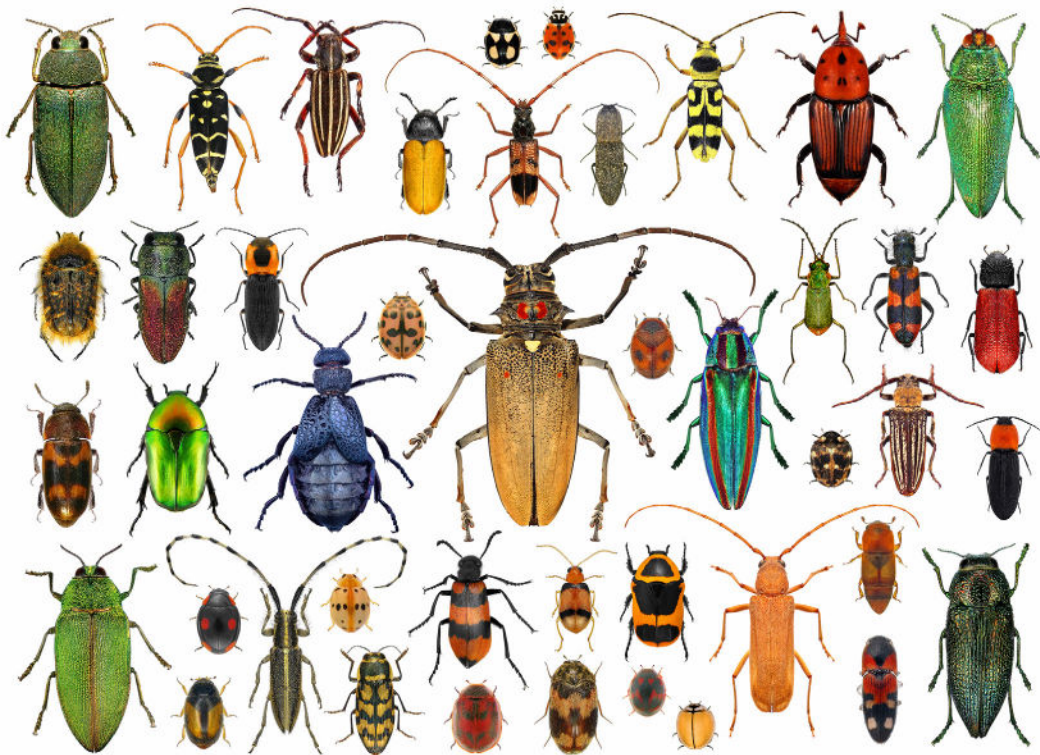


This beetle cannot fly.

The birdwing butterfly is the biggest of all butterflies. It can have an eleven-inch wingspan!

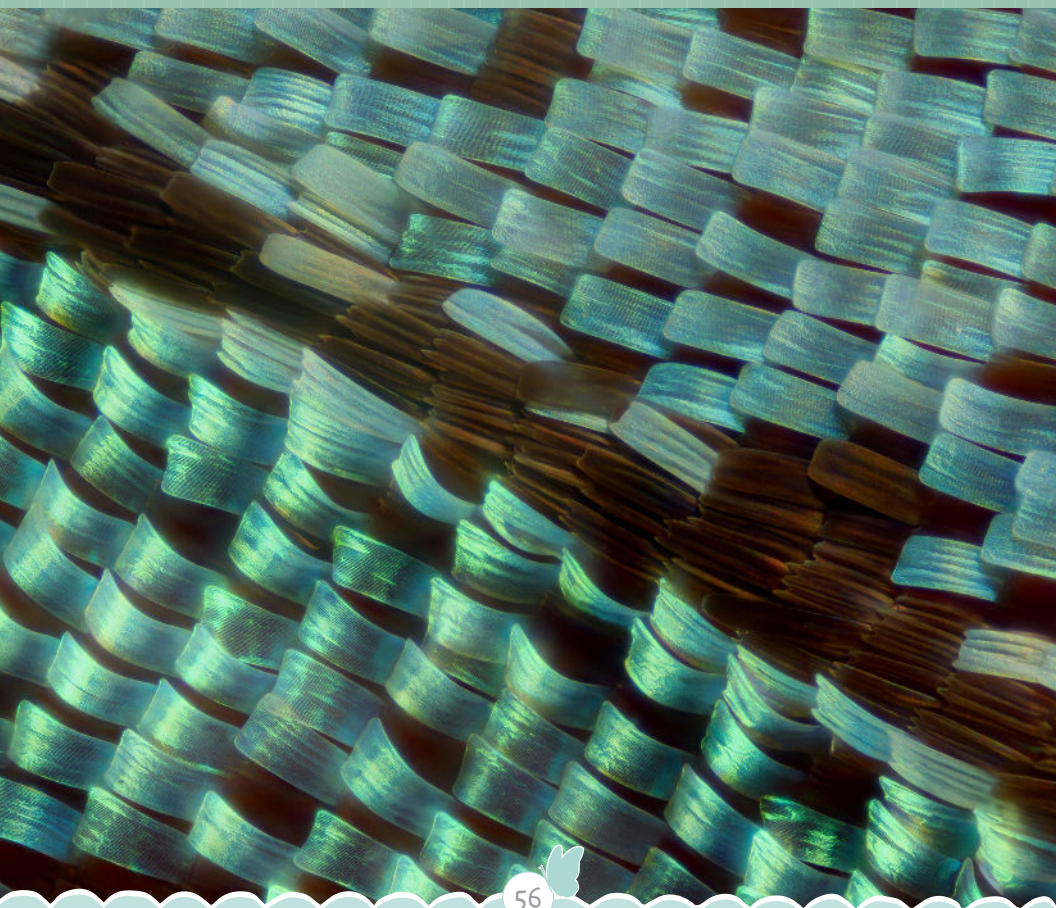




To eat, a butterfly sucks
